Reflection: Sunday 5th January 2024 Second Sunday after Christmas, Epiphany

When Paul was on his way to Damascus to arrest followers of the Messiah, he was knocked to the ground in an experience which he later described as meeting the risen Jesus. He saw the light in more ways than one, and he went away to talk to others and to spend a long time in the desert on his own in contemplation and study. He came to realise two things: first, that the teaching of the Messiah which had angered him so much revealed that God's truth was not for Jews only but for all people of every race and nation; and second, that he himself had to go and tell people about it.

He describes the truth that had dawned on him as a 'mystery', which had not been understood even though the prophets had preached about it. Isaiah talks about the light shining out and penetrating the darkness and drawing to the Lord people of every nation. And Paul knew that whatever it cost him, he must share that revelation which had now been entrusted to the Apostles. What Paul experienced is what we call an 'Epiphany'.

The Apostles were not actually the first people to experience this. The first were the 'Wise Men', the astrologers who although they were not Jews, were among the very first people to acknowledge Jesus as the Messiah and to worship him. That is their only real importance in the story. We may give a symbolism to the gifts they offered – but surely, they had to carry gold pay for travel, and they carried spices on the spice road from the east. They offered what they had and what kept them alive.

And so must we. The Feast of the Epiphany represents the fact that we all are called to 'see the light' in some way, and like St. Paul to share the truth revealed in the birth and death of our Saviour, Jesus of Nazareth.

Bible Readings: Sunday 5th January 2024 Second Sunday after Christmas, Epiphany

Isaiah 60.1-6

60 Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you.

2 For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the Lord will arise upon you,

and his glory will appear over you.

- 3 Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.
- 4 Lift up your eyes and look around; they all gather together, they come to you; your sons shall come from far away,

and your daughters shall be carried on their nurses' arms.

- 5 Then you shall see and be radiant; your heart shall thrill and rejoice, because the abundance of the sea shall be brought to you, the wealth of the nations shall come to you.
- 6 A multitude of camels shall cover you, the young camels of Midian and Ephah; all those from Sheba shall come. They shall bring gold and frankincense,

and shall proclaim the praise of the Lord .

Ephesians 3.1-12

- 3 This is the reason that I Paul am a prisoner for Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles-
- 2 for surely you have already heard of the commission of God's grace that was given to me for you,
- 3 and how the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I wrote above in a few words,
- 4 a reading of which will enable you to perceive my understanding of the mystery of Christ.
- 5 In former generations this mystery was not made known to humankind, as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit:
- 6 that is, the Gentiles have become fellow-heirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.
- 7 Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given to me by the working of his power.
- 8 Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ,
- 9 and to make everyone see what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; 10 so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places.
- 11 This was in accordance with the eternal purpose that he has carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord,
- 12 in whom we have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in him.

Matthew 2.1-12

- 2 In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem.
- 2 asking, 'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage.'
- 3 When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him;
- 4 and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born.
- 5 They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:
- 6 "And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler

who is to shepherd my people Israel."

- 7 Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared.
- 8 Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, 'Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage.'
- 9 When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was.
- 10 When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy.
- 11 On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure-chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.
- 12 And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Creator of the heavens, who led the Magi by a star to worship the Christ-child: guide and sustain us, that we may find our journey's end in Jesus Christ our Lord.

The Emergence of Focal Ministry



As the shape of ministry changes across our diocese, many people are feeling called to offer spiritual leadership in their local church.

Focal Ministry is the name being given to this emerging form of ministry, which involves enabling prayer and worship, encouraging others in deepening their faith and equipping local churches to bless their communities.

The role of a Focal Minister is to offer spiritual leadership to a local church or benefice. They are faithful people who are:

- **Rooted** in their community
- The visible face of the church
- **Fruitful** in encouraging the growth of faith and gifts in others.

Liz Rawlings, our Discipleship and Vocations Enabler, has been reflecting on what she has been noticing, and explains: "As I have travelled around the diocese, I have met a number of people offering local leadership in their churches, enabling prayer and worship, building faith in others and connecting the church with the community.

"It seems that God is at work growing local spiritual leaders and it's inspiring to hear their stories. Our task now is to serve and support this ministry and share what the Spirit is doing among us."
