Reflection: Sunday 26th October 2025 Last Sunday after Trinity

Luke 18: 9-14

Here we return to a theme liberally peppered throughout the New Testament, the false piety of the Pharisee (the religious leader) versus the genuine repentance of the tax collector (the ordinary person). The parody Jesus gives us is so exaggerated that we can almost miss the point. The litany of virtues the Pharisee gives himself and the disparaging way that he dismisses the tax collector sound absurd to the ear, I mean can anyone be that bigoted and prejudiced. But that doesn't mean that in everyday life we cannot fall into the same trap as this pharisee. We live in a country where the narrative is becoming increasingly hostile towards those who are sick and disabled, the unemployed, refugees and asylum seekers. So how far away from this pharisee are British people who say or feel:" I thank you God that I am a net contributor to wealth in Britain, unlike this unemployed/ disabled/asylum seeker/refugee." Yet Jesus tells us that the tax collector was humble before God and confessed his faults and left God's presence forgiven and sanctified, whereas the Pharisee left the presence of God with just his empty boasting and slogans as his reward.

Ecclesiasticus 35.12-17

- 12 Give to the Most High as he has given to you, and as generously as you can afford.
- 13 For the Lord is the one who repays, and he will repay you sevenfold.
- 14 Do not offer him a bribe, for he will not accept it;

and do not rely on a dishonest sacrifice; for the Lord is the judge,

and with him there is no partiality.

16 He will not show partiality to the poor; but he will listen to the prayer of one who is wronged.

17 He will not ignore the supplication of the orphan, or the widow when she pours out her complaint.

Jeremiah 14.7-10, 19-end

7 Although our iniquities testify against us, act, O Lord, for your name's sake; our apostasies indeed are many,

and we have sinned against you.

8 O hope of Israel,

its saviour in time of trouble, why should you be like a stranger in the land,

like a traveller turning aside for the night?

9 Why should you be like someone confused, like a mighty warrior who cannot give help? Yet you, O Lord, are in the midst of us,

and we are called by your name;

do not forsake us!

10 Thus says the Lord concerning this people: Truly they have loved to wander,

they have not restrained their feet; therefore the Lord does not accept them,

now he will remember their iniquity and punish their sins.

19 Have you completely rejected Judah?

Does your heart loathe Zion? Why have you struck us down

so that there is no healing for us? We look for peace, but find no good;

for a time of healing, but there is terror instead.

20 We acknowledge our wickedness, O Lord, the iniquity of our ancestors, for we have sinned against you.

21 Do not spurn us, for your name's sake; do not dishonour your glorious throne; remember and do not break your covenant with us.

22 Can any idols of the nations bring rain?

Or can the heavens give showers? Is it not you, O Lord our God?

We set our hope on you, for it is you who do all this.

2 Timothy 4.6-8, 16-18

6 As for me, I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come.

7 I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith.

8 From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give to me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for his appearing.

16 At my first defence no one came to my support, but all deserted me. May it not be counted against them!

17 But the Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed and all the Gentiles might hear it. So I was rescued from the lion's mouth.

18 The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and save me for his heavenly kingdom. To him be the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Luke 18.9-14

9 He also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and regarded others with contempt:

10 'Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax-collector.

11 The Pharisee, standing by himself, was praying thus, "God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax-collector.

12 I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of all my income."

13 But the tax-collector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!"

14 I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted.'

Our Churches continue to support local Foodbanks.

Jubilee Foodbank Market Harborough

You can drop off donations at **Hallaton Church** or to Linda Jones at **25**, **Eastgate**, **Hallaton** *at any time*. Please note that all food collected is non-perishable, long-life or tinned.

The Foodbank has MOST URGENT NEED of:

Hot Dogs (Tins or jars,) Tinned ham, Tinned Carrots, Corned Beef, Tinned red meat, Tinned meatballs, Chicken in sauce, Dried potatoes (Smash).

They also need:

Marmalade, Jam, Biscuits, Tinned potatoes, Crisps, Tinned tomatoes, Tinned chickpeas, mixed chilli beans, lentils, Custard, Tinned rice pudding, Sachet meals (pan or microwave), 'No Cook' meals for the homeless, Cordial. Coffee (), small jars Fray Bentos pies, UHT milk (whole or semi-skimmed), Pasta sauce, Crackers, Tinned soup, Cup of soup, Sugar (500g), Tinned sausages with beans, Tinned peas, Tinned fruit, Tinned vegetarian meals, such as veggie chilli, Meals that do not need cooking e.g. John West Fish and rice meals, Snacks and cereal bars, Fruit squash/juice, Microwave puddings, Pasta sauce, Peanut butter, Tinned pasta, Tinned sweetcorn, Sandwich paste, Teabags, Tuna, ALPRO yoghurts (long-life, for the shelf not fridge), Long-life meals, Robinsons minis or similar for families (small squash concentrates), Small cartons of long life milk (for homeless people or someone without a fridge)

Where possible and available, consider giving tins with a ring-pull as these can also be used for homeless people where the food is appropriate (e.g. fish, tinned fruit, etc)



Buy your Christmas Card Stamps and support humanitarian work in Sudan and South Sudan

The war in Sudan has been described as 'The Forgotten War'. Did you know that:

- * Half of Sudan's population more than 24.8 million people, almost 13.6 million of whom are children – are in need of urgent assistance.
- * Sudan now has the world's largest number of internally displaced people, with more than 11 million people uprooted by the conflict which began in April 2023; 2 million more have left Sudan in search of safety.

The churches in Sudan and South Sudan are in a desperate situation as they provide humanitarian aid to both the general population and their members.

By buying new UK stamps through the CASSS (the Church Association of Sudan and South Sudan) you provide financial aid within standard prices. CASSS is a registered charity that buys the stamps legally through a stamp dealer at retail value. This allows CASSS to sell the stamps to you at normal wholesale prices. The difference in price provides funds for food and security to internal refugees sheltered by the churches. Stamps are available in all denominations. These include 'special edition' stamps not commonly available. Please give your orders to John and Mary Twidell by Friday. October 31st. Your stamps will then be delivered to

Racial Equity Implementation, the Diocese and You



"We are more than halfway through Black History Month and, from a racial equity perspective, I wanted to provide an update on how the department has been developing over the past year," writes Sophie Holder, Diocesan Director of Racial Equity.

"When my role began at the end of 2024, a Racial Equity Strategy had already been created in the Diocese a few years prior. This provided a solid foundation upon which to craft and guide implementation. I further distilled the strategy into seven focal points that will progress the Diocese towards becoming a racially equitable organisation and culture in the areas of Governance, Recruitment, Training and Development, Raising Awareness, Education and Support, Local Parish and Worship, and Children and Young People / Schools."
