Reflection: Sunday 6th July 2025

Third Sunday after Trinity

This Sunday we hope everyone can meet together at Church Langton to express thanks to Jonathan Dowman and wish him well in his new work in Norfolk. He has done so much to bring the Minster Community together and to develop vital ministry in our Schools. Inevitably we shall be reflecting on what we have achieved and making plans for the next stages of developing our ministry in this area.

What we have been able to do is to arrange services in our churches. It may not have been easy to co-ordinate a programme of times and tastes to suit everyone but a new pattern is emerging, thanks to a lot of hard work from those who enable us to communicate with each other. The main challenge for us, however, is the need to provide pastoral care in all the parishes. People are being cared for, of course, but this has traditionally been the responsibility of resident Incumbents, and those people are no longer available.

Our readings this week make it clear that pastoral care is at the heart of our Christian life. Isaiah tells those whom he is encouraging to return from Babylon to Jerusalem that God's presence there will be a source of comfort and nourishment – "that you may nurse and be satisfied from her consoling breast". Paul, writing to his friends in Galatia, urges them "whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially those of the household of faith."

Jesus in his ministry drew to himself many disciples, but he also involved them actively in his work, sending out 70 to make people aware of all that he could offer to the world. The truth he offered was vital and challenging. Just as people re-entering the Holy Land shook the dust of foreign lands off their feet, so that dramatic action would be under-stood to convey the importance of the presence of the Kingdom of God in peoples' lives.

Our resources for continuing this work may be limited but they are in us because God has provided them. Let us all seek new ways of fulfilling our calling and responsibilities.

Isaiah 66.10-14

- 10 Rejoice with Jerusalem, and be glad for her,
all you who love her; rejoice with her in joy,
all you who mourn over her-
- 11 that you may nurse and be satisfied
from her consoling breast; that you may drink deeply
with delight
from her glorious bosom.
- 12 For thus says the Lord: I will extend prosperity to
her like a river,
and the wealth of the nations like an overflowing
stream; and you shall nurse and be carried on her arm,
and dandled on her knees.
- 13 As a mother comforts her child,
so I will comfort you;
you shall be comforted in Jerusalem.
- 14 You shall see, and your heart shall rejoice;
your bodies shall flourish like the grass; and it shall be
known that the hand of the Lord is with his servants,
and his indignation is against his enemies.

Galatians 6. [1-6] 7-16

- [1 My friends, if anyone is detected in a transgression,
you who have received the Spirit should restore such a
one in a spirit of gentleness. Take care that you
yourselves are not tempted.
- 2 Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will
fulfil the law of Christ.
- 3 For if those who are nothing think they are something,
they deceive themselves.
- 4 All must test their own work; then that work, rather
than their neighbour's work, will become a cause for
pride.
- 5 For all must carry their own loads.
- 6 Those who are taught the word must share in all good
things with their teacher.]
- 7 Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap
whatever you sow.
- 8 If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption
from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap
eternal life from the Spirit.
- 9 So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we
will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up.
- 10 So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us
work for the good of all, and especially for those of the
family of faith.
- 11 See what large letters I make when I am writing in
my own hand!

12 It is those who want to make a good showing in the
flesh that try to compel you to be circumcised-only that
they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ.

13 Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the
law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they
may boast about your flesh.

14 May I never boast of anything except the cross of our
Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified
to me, and I to the world.

15 For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is
anything; but a new creation is everything!

16 As for those who will follow this rule-peace be upon
them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

Luke 10.1-11, 16-20

10 After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent
them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place
where he himself intended to go.

2 He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the
labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest
to send out labourers into his harvest.

3 Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs
into the midst of wolves.

4 Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one
on the road.

5 Whatever house you enter, first say, "Peace to this
house!"

6 And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your
peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to
you.

7 Remain in the same house, eating and drinking
whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be
paid. Do not move about from house to house.

8 Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome
you, eat what is set before you;

9 cure the sick who are there, and say to them, "The
kingdom of God has come near to you."

10 But whenever you enter a town and they do not
welcome you, go out into its streets and say,

11 "Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet,
we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the
kingdom of God has come near."

16 'Whoever listens to you listens to me, and whoever
rejects you rejects me, and whoever rejects me rejects
the one who sent me.'

17 The seventy returned with joy, saying, 'Lord, in your
name even the demons submit to us!'

18 He said to them, 'I watched Satan fall from heaven
like a flash of lightning.

19 See, I have given you authority to tread on snakes
and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and
nothing will hurt you.

20 Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits
submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in
heaven.'

Food Bank Appeal:

Our Churches continue to support local Foodbanks. **Jubilee Foodbank Market Harborough** You can drop off donations at **Hallaton Church** or to Linda Jones at **25, Eastgate, Hallaton at any time**. Please note that all food collected is non-perishable, long-life or tinned.

The Foodbank has **MOST URGENT NEED of:**

Chicken in sauce, Pasta sauce, UHT milk (whole or semi-skimmed), Tinned fruit, Tinned pasta

They also need:

Fray Bentos pies, Crackers, Sandwich paste, Tinned ham, Tinned red meat, such as mince, Bolognese, stew, chilli, and hot dogs, Sweets, snacks and crisps Tinned sweetcorn, Tinned carrots, Tinned peas, Tinned tomatoes, Biscuits, Dried potatoes (Smash), Corned beef, Teabags, Cup of Soup, Tinned potatoes, Sugar (500g), John West rice meals, ALPRO yoghurts (long-life, for the shelf not fridge), Sponge puddings, Long-life meals, Robinsons minis or similar for families (small squash concentrates), Small cartons of long life milk (for homeless people or someone without a fridge)
